GUIDELINES FOR PAPERS

SUBMISSION **DEADLINE: October 1, 2017**

Papers must be **single-spaced, Times New Roman, 12, and their minimum length should be 5000 words.**

They must include:

- an **abstract**, which should be at most 10 lines long, followed by at least **five keywords**;
- the author's **name** and **the name of home University** underneath the paper's title;
- **an introductory unit, clear headings and subheadings, a concluding unit**;
- **quotations** in the text should be signaled by "double quotation marks". 'Single quotes' will only be used within double quotes;
- for additional information, use only **endnotes** which should be identified in the text by **superscript numbers**;
- **references** should be identified in the text by the name of the author(s) and the year of publication according to the following example: "... as mentioned by Barry (2002)"; "... as has been argued (Barry 2002, 25)". For References to two or more papers by the same authors in the same year, the year should be followed by a letter (a, b, c, etc.);
- **all citations and references** in the text must be listed fully in the **Reference** section at the end of the paper, by alphabetical order of authors, with complete bibliographical details as follows:
